NOISES OFF

BOYS BEHAVING BADLY...



Bouncers was chosen by the National Theatre as one of 100 'plays of the century'. In the 40+ years since it was first performed at the Edinburgh fringe, it is now 'not so much a play as it is a social phenomenon... there is barely a language it hasn't been translated into, not a country it hasn't conquered' [The Guardian].

Even so, would Sherborne in 2025 be ready for the scatalogical nightmare of the Gents toilet in Mr Cinders night club in the days of Disco? A scene from Dante's Inferno, as we were told by Les, the youngest of the four men in black. We heard a lot about bodily fluids in the course of the evening - to the

point that I could literally hear the stickiness of the floor of the night club with every footstep on stage - and about the booze, the birds and the *braggadocio* that made for a top night out in 1980.

Did we flinch? We did not. Sherborne could take it. In fact, Sherborne loved it. For the older members of the audience, it was a nostalgia-fuelled joyride down Memory Lane to the days of our misspent youth. For younger ones, there was something like envy for we who had strutted our stuff to Chic or Frankie Goes to Hollywood in those primal, un-woke times. In those days, a pint of lager



cost 45p, Aramis was the aftershave of choice for the lads, and repeats of *Till Death Us Do Part* were still on the telly.

The set was minimalist – steps up to the club's double doors, 'Mr Cinders' in pink neon above, and a glitter ball above that. And the lighting was equally straightforward – we met the bouncers in harsh, directional light from above, casting shadows down their faces. Tough guys.

The boys are Lucky Eric (Freddie Wopat), Judd (Gary Brooks), Ralph (Jordan Wiseman) and Les (Harry Wopat). Two of them (Freddie and Gary) were recently seen multi-roleing brilliantly in The Thirty Nine Steps, but in the case of Bouncers, they and their fellow cast members have to transform in the blink of an eye from boy to girl, from punk to punter, from DJ to porn star to toff with no help from the costume department or the set. In Bouncers, every change is achieved solely through the physical and vocal skill of the actor. The one and only prop they were allowed was a glitzy clutch bag each when Eric, Ralph, Les and Judd became Maureen, Suzy, Rosie and Elaine.



It is a huge credit to each of them, and to the Director, Sarah Webster, that these fully individuated characters flashed confidently into and out of existence simply by changes of voice, expression, posture and gait.



Jordan made his APS debut as Ralph - 'Mr Inner Calm' – whose quiet physical presence was every bit as menacing that of his noisier companions. A bouncer you would not choose to mess with. Which of course made his comic transformations all the funnier, as sleazy DJ Michael Dee, Nobby the Swedish postman, and especially as Suzy, the last girl left at the club - ever hopeful - at 2am.



Gary was the confrontational Judd, forever needling Eric for being soft and over the hill. Then, with a change of pitch and body language, Judd becomes Cheryl, the hair stylist who overcooks Suzy under the dryer and talks High Street fashion with Maureen. Moments later, Cheryl morphs into a male barber cracking terrible jokes to his customers, adding the inevitable: 'Anything for the weekend, sir?' And finally, Gary turns into the determined 'plain Elaine' who physically overpowers Kev and means to have her way with him.

Another debutant at APS, Harry, played feisty, aggressive Les and a range of clubgoers of every gender and accent with energy and pinsharp precision – a shrill scouser, a braying toff, a pogoing punk, heartbroken Rosie, and of course Kev (up-for-anything-except-Elaine). It was virtuoso stuff.



Harry's Dad, Freddie Wopat, played the older, (slightly) wiser bouncer Eric, the last guttering candle of civilisation left in the jungle. Freddie has shown us his comedic chops many times at APS, but he added real poignancy here, delivering his 'big speeches' quietly, sadly, as monologues directly to the audience.

He told the story of the very drunk, very young girl who was abused by six leering men in a crowded pub. Eric intervened, pleading with her: 'Go home. Just go home.' Fred did this masterfully. We listened in rapt silence. Proper theatre, that was.

Well done lads – and well done Sarah, who trusted the audience to enjoy this show on its own terms, and be moved by it too.




Falstaff is a role that Giles Shenton was born to play.
